Shelter/Interim Housing







Example – Tiny Home



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» The Riverside Village Shelter

- 30 pods/tiny shelters
- Dining area, showers, restrooms, bike rack, resource center
- \$8,495 (2021) per unit

» Who does it serve?

• Men, women, and couples

» How long do clients stay?

• 60 – 90 days

Example – Tiny Home

» Services Offered?

- Pet accommodation
- 24/7 security
- Case management
- Housing navigation
- Life/job skills training
- Mental health

» How did they collaborate?

- Adjacent to the Access Center & other non-profits
- Meal assistance from Everytable at a low cost of \$5.20 per meal
- Set up close to a large encampment





Heading Home

Example – Scattered Site Bridge Housing

» Definition

- Scattered site units offer the highest level of client autonomy
- Clients can stabilize, collect documents, and apply for permanent housing while receiving weekly visits from their providers

» Who does it serve?

• Clients with a range of acuity levels





» How long do clients stay?

• 3 months – 2 years

» How did they collaborate?

- Owned and master leased buildings and apartments
- Significant property owner engagement

Rental Assistance





Forms of Rental Assistance

- » Short-Term –up to 3 months
- » Mid-Term more than 3 months; up to 2 years
- Shallow or Deep Subsidy set amount or percent of income









Example – Rental Assistance

» Who does it serve?

- Short-term Individuals with income, document ready
- Mid-term Families, individuals with SMI, participants requiring support to increase their income, individuals who are not document ready

» How long do clients receive assistance?

- Short-term 90 days
- Mid-term up to 1 year





» Services offered?

- Motel vouchers, recovery residences, shared-living and traditional rental units, security deposits
- Housing service plans and housing navigation

» Collaboration with the CoC?

• The cities collaborated with their CoC, service provider (Union Station), and motels within the community.

Master Leasing



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- » Agencies lease housing units from property owners (usually more than 1).
- » Agencies sublease individual units to individual clients/families.
- » Mutually beneficial:
 - Quick way to get units
 - Clients can move in & out



Example: Brilliant Corners – Master Leasing

» Services offered?

- Move-in assistance
- Property owner incentives
- Housing navigation
- Eviction prevention
- Case management & services through collaboration

» How did they collaborate?

- Strong relationships with property owners
- Client referrals from a range of different county partners
- Close partnerships with case managers from 40+ agencies
- Close partnerships with MHSA funded Full Service Partnership program

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» Identifying what your clients need

» Finding available properties

- Property owner engagement
- County owned properties
- State owned properties
- Collaborate with community agencies

Innovative Models

- Tiny homes
 - Master-leased units or buildings
- Office, school, or warehouse

- Faith community properties
- Duplexes or homes

Hotels and motels

- Unused health facilities
- Scattered-site individual units









Housing Navigation





Housing Navigation

- » A service that helps clients remove barriers and move into housing
 - Individualized plans & approach
 - Obtaining necessary documents
 - Communicating with property owners
 - Once a week meetings w/ clients
 - Low-barrier
 - Funds for move-in process
